Well, the last couple weeks have been interesting to say the least. Two weeks ago, I came down with a virus when attending my brother's celebration of life, and a week later (according to the doctor), the ripple effect of the virus inflamed my vocal chords, so now I feel like I'm talking through a fan, which isn't a bad thing considering the air conditioner in the office broke down during the same period of time.

When it rains, it pours, I guess.

On a bright note when it comes to Sunday, I have two words: short sermon!

So, a thought raced through my mind recently, and I feel it strangely pulling me in several directions. Maybe it's the added medications I'm on for laryngitis that has me going rogue squirrel, but I think it's something else.

As I've been working on the message for this week, a thought randomly occurred to me regarding another sermon series. I would endeavor to have this series address a narrowly controlled aspect of the Christian faith, but it would be in response to your responses.

So, here's my thought. I got to wondering today what three things are that has been revolutionary to how I live my life as a disciple of Jesus Christ. Since I really haven't had time to give this much thought before writing this, I am going to share the three aspects of Jesus' teachings that are the first to come to my mind.

First, understanding the context of Jesus' ministry in the first century is important because as we reflect on it 2,000 years later, the contexts are not the same – especially for North Americans. Understanding that Jesus was not white with blonde hair and blue eyes matters; those tend to be European depictions of him. In Jesus' context, ministry was mostly with those living in abject poverty; what I feel Jesus did was heal people of their diseases and conditions and, when possible, provide gateways for the wealthy to connect with the poor. But Jesus NEVER would have been elected to any position in government then or now; any thought of it today and throughout history has been the result of bad and dangerous theology. To add to this, Jesus' ministry was about relief to the poor, comfort to the afflicted, and companionship for those who were forgotten. Is ours?

Second, Jesus was all about community but for people to really thrive in community, they must be vulnerable with one another. Vulnerability means taking risks. It means stepping out of comfort zones. Vulnerability means getting comfortable with things that make people uncomfortable, such as meeting strangers, asking for what you need, and not being so individualistic you think you can do everything without the benefit of anyone else. I think this is what Jesus meant when he said to let your light shine because sometimes God will need your light in those shadowy places, so light will bring illumination – sometimes to others, but often to yourself. Do you let your light shine this way?

Third, following Jesus means experiencing our own deaths and resurrection(s). It means continually confronting in ourselves what isn't true or authentic to the image of God we bear. As y'all know, I've recently experienced some deaths in my family: my oldest brother, and my beloved sister as well as two cousins. Experiencing their deaths (along with another brother's passing in 2020) has meant not just facing my own mortality; it has challenged me to adapt to a life that was heavily influenced by events that happened when I was a 7-year-old. Death and resurrection, for me, means living forward and letting myself be raised to a new life now. I don't know if I can explain it better.

So, in all sincerity: What are your three things you've learned from your faith in Jesus? Please email them to me at <u>rev.mark.crist74@gmail.com</u>. Great Plains Conference 2024







Great Plains Conference was very interesting! This was the 10th anniversary of the merger of the two Kansas conferences and Nebraska's conference creating the Great Plains Conference. The conference has now moved to the new Building in Topeka. Prior to this they were in three separate offices in Wichita, Topeka and Lincoln.

At General Conference it was voted to change the language in the Book of Discipline. This removed the language that prohibited pastors form officiating same sex marriages and also removed the language prohibiting the ordination of LGBTQ persons in the UMC. You may talk to a council member to see how this will be addressed in our local church.

They also decided that Churches will no longer be allowed to disaffiliate. The UMC is now looking forward to the future of our church.

Great Plains Conference has also been redistricted and they have renamed the regions. We are now called the North Central Kansas Region. We were formerly called the Salina-Hutchinson Region. Karen Rice Ratzlaff will remain as our District Superintendent.

We have two firsts in the General Conferences, our previous DS, Dee Williamson has been appointed as the first black woman Bishop! She is now serving in the Louisiana Conference. Our own Bishop David Wilson is the first Native American Bishop for the UMC. (Shown in the Pictures above on the Right and Left sides.

On Saturday morning the Youth were in charge of the Worship Service. Shown above is the Youth Leader, Emma, she gave the sermon, which was amazing! The music was comprised of several of the youth.

Bishop David Wilson and Rev Hollie Tapley talked about the Santee Sioux Nation Reservation in Northeastern Nebraska, they have been under a no drink order since 2019. Donations are being accepted. You can scan the QR code or send them to PO Box 4187, Topeka, Ks. 66604. Any excess money will go into the disaster fund.












Summer Book and Bible Study Sign up sheet on Bulletin Board
