A few months ago, I had an interesting conversation with a colleague when I was asked what my vision for ministry is.

I shared with him that my vision is about the quest for healing rather than salvation. I told him the reason I believed healing needed to be the priority was because Jesus' focus was more often on healing than salvation. He asked me, "well, aren't they the same?" I told him, "yes" and "no." For some, the notion of salvation is individualistic and even selfish because some make salvation about "the end times" or "getting into heaven." And when something so important as salvation has room in it to disregard others, I'm not sure that's what Jesus was after, and I'm not sure that's what Jesus' crucifixion or resurrection were about. After all, Jesus did say he had other sheep his followers didn't know about.

So, tell me about the alternative, my friend asked. I told him, for me healing is what comes from what Martin Luther King referred to as the beloved community. In the beloved community, people learn about what they don't understand, and they learn to serve others who are not like them. When love does not mix with power or privilege, healing is the result. For me, a healed community is what Jesus referred to as the "Kin-dom of God." (Just a note: I often remove the "g" in kin-dom to specify how we all are part of one another and God's creation; we are "kin" to one another everywhere.)

One of the things I've seen, particularly since September 11, 2001, is what seems to be a rise in brokenness in the United States and, possibly, globally. That brokenness makes it easier for hurt people to hurt people. What I believe is needed is to get behind the reasons for the hurt, of which I believe there are many. Until that happens, the hurting will sadly continue.

Just as hurt people hurt others, however, healed people are agents of healing for others. John and Charles Wesley discovered this when they had their conversion experiences days apart. Once they had their hearts "strangely warmed" – as John Wesley described it – they became true servants. Up until that time, the brothers served because they thought it was what they had to do. After their conversions, they sought doing justice, loving kindness, and walking humbly with God. After their conversions, they fed the hungry, gave drink to the thirsty, they welcomed the stranger, they clothed the naked, and visited the sick.

In serving others, the Wesley boys discovered something else. They learned their stories. They made friendships. They found hurting people healing and healed people offering healing to others, and their humble beginnings eventually led to the largest North American church at one time, and the church we celebrate being a part of today. They encouraged unity and dialogue and while there have been times the church would split, when people would heal over time, the church would come back together.

For me, healing is necessary work. As I've healed (and continue healing), I've realized how messy healing can be, not just in my case but in others' cases, as well. Healing, like grief, is something that has its own distinct shape for every person. And it takes time and effort, but in the end it's worth it because healing restores relationships and healing nurtures the blessed community.

Henri Nouwen once coined the term "wounded healer", and I don't know of a term that could describe the importance of healing better. I'm certain there are others who would like to be healed and heal others. For those who recognize it, good for you! That's a starting point. For those who are discerning it, keep at it. It'll come to you. For those who don't recognize it, you're in my prayers.

So, until next time just keep pedaling. Pastor Mark Crist


United Methodist Church Campers


United Women In Faith




Commodities

It just amazes me how caring our community is! When I ask the community to help, they are there! Each and every (other) month we have volunteers from all over the community show up no matter what the weather is! When I see some of the people who receive the food they always say thank you! Or "I don't know how I could feed my kids without the extra food from commodities!" So to all of the volunteers who help with this program "THANK YOU! FROM THE PEOPLE WHO RECEIVE THE FOOD!"

Last month we helped a total 102 Households, 64 Singles, 16 Couples, 22 Families, for a total of 176 people served.

As of July 1, 2024 the income guidelines have increased, for a single person they cannot make over \$1,632.00, for each additional person you would add \$583.00.




